Dear Students, Parents and Grandparents,

From the Vice-Principal's Desk

Dear Parents,

As we close another successful term, it's time to reflect not only on the academic milestones but also on the journey our children are undertaking as individuals. This term, like all others, had its highs and lows, but what stands out most is the growth we see in our students—not just in what they know, but in who they are becoming.

We often focus on academic progress, but we must remember that much of who our children become is shaped by what they consume —emotionally, intellectually, and socially—not just what they learn at home or at school. So, how do we, as a community, enable and truly understand this development beyond these familiar environments?

It begins with attentiveness. By watching our children closely and creating spaces for meaningful conversation. I encourage you to establish simple routines reinforcing the metacognitive strategies that children are learning in school through discussions around the dinner table. Ask them: What was the highest point of your day? What was the lowest?



Did you challenge yourself to learn something new today? What did you learn today?' or 'How did you solve that problem?' to help spark powerful reflective thinking. Share your own stories, engage, and do so without the distraction of gadgets. This is where real connection happen.

On weekends, take time to bond through routines that teach humility and resilience. Whether it's a sport, a walk, a bike ride, or simply involving them in household work, volunteering at an animal shelter etc these experiences leave lasting lessons that go far beyond the classroom. We also want to create more opportunities and practices for children to take active charge of the cleanliness and organization of their own learning spaces. By encouraging them to take ownership of their surroundings, both in school and at home, we empower them to build responsibility, pride, and discipline—qualities that will serve them well both during and beyond their school years.

And then, the question of academic progress naturally arises. This term's results—whether it's marks in the middle and higher grades, or descriptive feedback in early and primary years—are not just about numbers or feedback. The conversation with your child should focus on the goals they set for themselves and how they navigated their own journey. Reflect together on their performance, identify deviations, discuss possible reasons for the same and most importantly, help them set new goals for the coming term. Encouraging the habit of journaling daily or weekly, along with mindfulness practices at home, can further help them become more self-aware and reflective as they work toward their goals. Regular discussions—perhaps fortnightly—can help keep these goals in sight and foster a mindset of continuous growth.

These reflective routines, both at home and at school, nurture one of the most sought-after skills: metacognition, the ability to think about one's own thinking. And it is this skill that opens up infinite possibilities for our learners to grow, evolve, and succeed.

As we end this term, and are ready to welcome a new one, I leave you with this thought: when we partner and work together to encourage reflection, children learn to think about their thinking, paving the way for deeper understanding and lifelong learning.

Wishing you all a reflective, restful break and looking forward to a new term filled with growth and possibilities.






ATL Day for MYP Students: A Day of Skills and Reflection

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
In the Spotlight - Senior School Library

MUN Culmination (Middle Years) Friday, July 26th

The Model United Nations (MUN) offers students a dynamic platform to simulate global diplomacy by assuming the roles of country delegates. Over the course of a month, students from grades 7 and 8 underwent intensive training facilitated by a dedicated team of interns from Alma College, Michigan. This comprehensive program culminated in a one-day conference held on the 26th of July 2024, marking the end of a deeply enriching experience.

During the conference, students showcased their newly acquired diplomatic skills by representing over 100 countries across multiple committees, including FAO, UNICEF, WHO, and UNHCR, tackling global issues. Key discussions included reducing food waste to combat hunger in FAO, ensuring digital learning access for all children in UNICEF, addressing healthcare gaps in fragile regions in WHO, and integrating refugees and IDPs into host communities in UNHCR.

The one-day MUN conference provided a platform for students to experience the complexities of global diplomacy and develop critical thinking, public speaking, and negotiation skills. By assuming the roles of international delegates, they gained a deeper understanding of global issues and the importance of collaboration in solving the world's most pressing problems. This event not only honed their academic abilities but also inspired them to become informed global citizens, ready to contribute to a more just and equitable world.









Preamble of the Indian Constitution

On August 8th, the Social Science department hosted an innovative educational program aimed at deepening students' understanding of the constitutional values embedded in the Preamble of the Indian Constitution. The program, conducted under the aegis of the Funkaar interdisciplinary unit, was a three-stage initiative that integrated classroom learning, experiential exposure, and creative reflection for grade 8 students.


The highlight of the program was a live performance by Kathakar Mandali, a theater group known for its powerful storytelling. The play, loosely based on George Orwell's Animal Farm, was adapted to reflect themes relevant to the Indian context, particularly those related to governance, justice, and equality. Through this performance, students were able to witness the practical implications of the constitutional values they had studied. Following the performance, students engaged in reflective activities designed to encourage them to express their understanding of the constitutional values in creative ways.

This stage allowed students to internalize and articulate the significance of their rights and responsibilities as citizens. Students created newspaper articles on controversial laws and how they have encroached upon various constitutional rights.











National Science Center



On May 17, Grade 8 students visited the National Science Centre, focusing on the theme of "Energy," particularly alternative and non-conventional sources. The trip was both enjoyable and educational, offering hands-on experiences with various scientific exhibits. Students explored physics, biology, and technology through interactive displays, experiments, and demonstrations.

The visit to the Gallery of Nuclear Science and independently making solar cars were the highlights. The experience sparked curiosity and deepened their understanding of scientific concepts, making the trip a valuable blend of fun and learning.

Student Led Conference Middle Years

Student-led conference (SLC) is an initiative that fosters accountability and ownership of learning among students. By incorporating goal setting and actively involving students in reflecting on their academic strengths, progress and areas for growth, these conferences empower students to take charge of their education while boosting their self-confidence and achievement.

The first session of this conference, "Knowing our Child," was held on May 3 and May 4, where students presented a reflection of their previous year's journey, their strengths, goals set by themselves for the current academic year, and the corresponding action plans.

The conference provided an opportunity to both the parents and the educators to understand what the learners need from them to help them succeed in their learning journey. We'll explore how best to nurture their growth and success and make sure they feel encouraged along the way.





A Symphony of Learning @Funkaar@MY

Shiv Nadar School recently celebrated the annual event, Funkaar, showcasing vibrant creativity, innovation and interdisciplinary learning.

Students from grade 6 engaged in an interdisciplinary unit centred around the theme of Light and Shadow, exploring the fascinating properties of light and its effects on shadows through experiments, creative writing, and artistic projects. Their understanding was evident in their pinhole cameras, black-out poetry, and kaleidoscopes. Students from grade 7 engaged in a variety of activities, including storyboarding, stop motion animation, and lab experiments, to inspire lifelong learning. Interdisciplinary projects, such as rap songs about physical and chemical changes and detailed posters on the Delhi Sultanate timeline, reinforced subject knowledge while encouraging creativity and critical thinking.

The students form grade 8 integrated Hindi, Social Studies and English, developing critical thinking, problem-solving and collaborative skills through activities like street plays and newspaper report writing. Funkaar continues to be a cherished tradition at Shiv Nadar School, offering students a platform to explore, create, and connect in ways that resonate with the school's commitment to holistic education



Empowering Students - Digital Literacy


In today's digital age, information is readily available online. It's important for students to be digitally literate so they can effectively access, evaluate, and use this information for learning. However, the internet can be a risky place, with potential threats such as cyberbullying, identity theft, and exposure to inappropriate content. Teaching students digital sensitization helps them navigate the online world safely and securely. We have conducted two sessions on digital literacy for the students.

The first session focused on 'Digital Footprint and Identity'. It covered why people create fake social media accounts, the consequences of posting from them, and included a video of teens discussing the issue. There was also a debate on the pros and cons of posting from multiple accounts.

The second session was on 'Media Usage'. Students created an inventory of their media choices, reflected on their impact, brainstormed strategies for balanced media use, and developed personal guidelines for healthy media habits.

Moving forward, we will be conducting more sessions on topics such as phishing, finding credible sources, etc.


Work for Kargil Learning beyond our Classrooms

Work for Kargil is an educational initiative that was founded in the year 2022 and embraces the sustainable development goal (SDG) 4. The initiative promotes 'quality education' especially in the remote and resource deprived region of India, Kargil. It initially began as a cultural expedition, and immediately inspired our students to assist and mentor the students studying in the local school via online live lessons. As time passed, they worked towards building a library of pre-recorded lectures, conducted debating sessions and raised over Rs. 75,000 in cash and coupons to provide 300+ books, sports equipment, essential stationary and menstrual hygiene products to facilitate quality education multidimensionally. Having already impacted 3 schools, we now intend to reach out to more schools in the region. The initiative is spearheaded by Manan, Ishika and Sarthak (students of grade 12 DP).
